Additional Notions Required

- 2 x Mill Hill Size 8 Pony beads - 18826
- 1 x Reeves Mini Canvas and Easel
- Small disc magnet for pin-keep
- 30cm x 20cm (12" x 11") rectangle of iron-on interfacing
- 12" x 12" sheet of patterned scrapbooking paper to line seat drawer.

Sourcing Your Additional Notions

- Scrapbooking paper can be sourced from your local scrapbooking store or online at amazon.com
- Mini easel and canvas from stationery stores, art stores or amazon.com
- Small disc magnet can be sourced from your local craft store.

You Will Need These Supplies and Tools On Hand To Help You Construct Your Chair:

- Sewing cotton to match linen
- Clear drying water-based craft glue
- Polyester quilt batting 30cm sq (12" square)
- Craft knife
- Masking tape
- Polyester toyfill
- Metal Ruler
- Elastic bands

Before You Start ...

- I recommend that you overlock or serge the piece of linen to prevent the edges from fraying.
- The use of a hoop or frame is a great idea to keep stitch tension even and to prevent over-handling of the linen. Having said that, if you prefer to stitch 'in-hand' please do so, but I would recommend that you use a hoop for the specialty stitches - they will look so much better, I promise!
- I suggest you read through all the instructions prior to commencing, so that you get a overview of the project.

Fabric Map

This project comprises various small, flat sections of hand-embroidered linen, manipulated to create a three dimensional chair.

As most people find it easier to work with one larger piece of fabric when stitching I have created a 'fabric map' which will enable you to complete all the individual panels on one piece of linen. These panels will later be cut out, ready for the finishing process. Please turn the page for instructions on how to set up your own fabric map for this project.
